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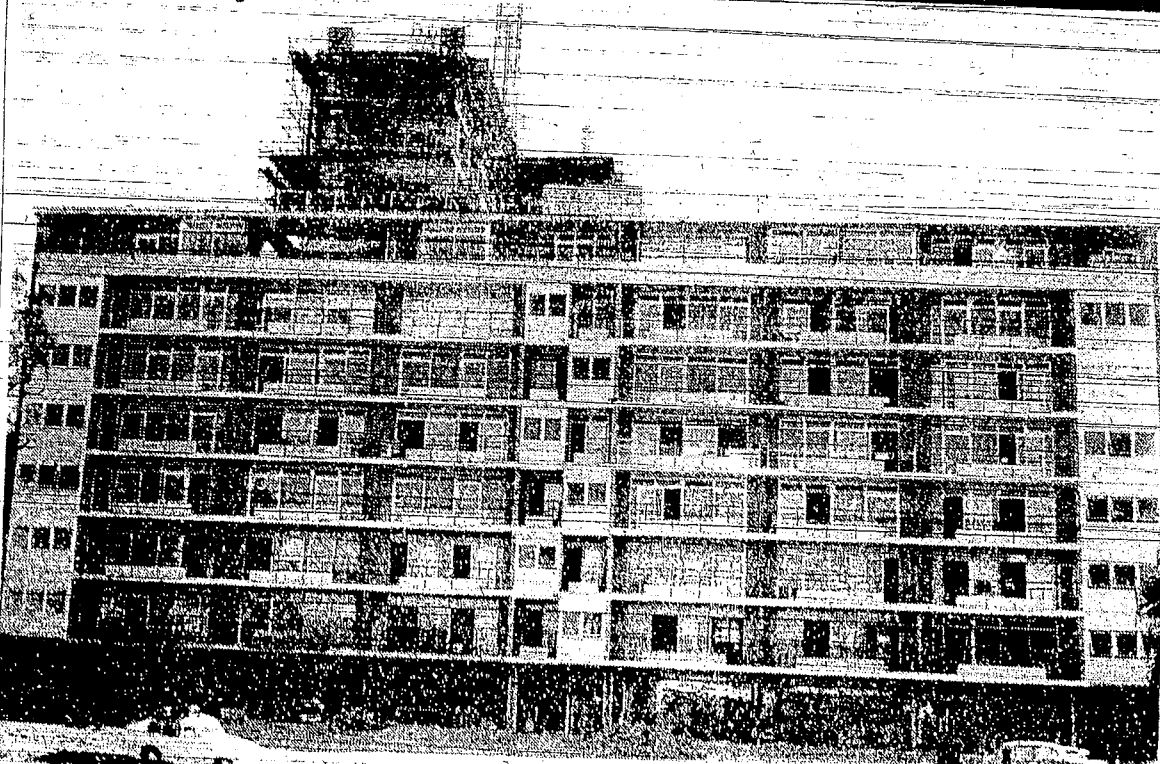
## New gear saved life

MELBOURNE.— A new instrument for applying artificial resuscitation, which had been in operation for only two days, saved the life of a young boy at Brighton Beach baths, near Melbourne, yesterday afternoon.

"If we had not had the new instrument, known as a 'resuscitube,' the chances of survival would have been much slimmer," the baths manager (Mr. Jack Lucas) said later.

The boy on whom the 'resuscitube' was used is Kevin Douglas Croft, 12, of the Melbourne suburb of Moorabbin.

He was trying to swim 100 yards across the deep end of the pool when he got into difficulties.

## 4000 Delegates for youth congress

THE biggest youth conference held in Queensland will start on Sunday at the Exhibition Ground under the sponsorship of the Methodist National Christian Education Department.

It will be the largest Christian Youth Convention with 4000 delegates.

Young people will come from all States, Tonga, Fiji, Arnhem Land, and New Guinea for the meetings, which will last until January 17.

The conference organization is a major headache for the Rev. Lewis Born, Queensland Methodist Conference's assistant youth director, who will be secretary of the convention.

Principal speaker will be the Rev. Maurice Barnett, a prominent British Methodist minister in Bradford.

On Sunday there will be a 9.30 a.m. service in the

Methodist Church, Brisbane, and the conference's inaugural service will be in the Botanic Gardens at 3 p.m. The Premier (Mr. Nicklin) will attend this.

From Monday to Friday public rallies will be held every night at the Exhibition Ground, and delegates will attend 15 "tutorials" in the afternoons. These tutorials will deal with worship and prayer, youth work, Christianity, and Communism, Christian courtship and marriage, and drama and music, among others.
